Stew Magnuson will read and discuss his new book, *The Death of Raymond Yellow Thunder: And Other True Stories from the Nebraska-Pine Ridge Border Towns*. The reading will be followed by a special screening of the Native American Rights Fund (NARF) new short documentary "Modern Day Warriors." The event is sponsored by NARF and is being held in celebration of National American Indian Heritage Month.

Magnuson's nonfiction book recounts 130 years of history between two different communities, the Ogala Lakotas of Pine Ridge, South Dakota and the white settler border towns of Sheridan County, Nebraska. The Nebraska Center for the Book Newsletter in a review by University of Nebraska-Lincoln Professor Emeritus Paul Olson, called the work "an invaluable account of the wars against our Native American citizens."

"Modern Day Warriors," is a short documentary film that covers the rise of the Native American rights movements from the 1960's to present day. The film contains powerful historic footage and interviews pertaining to some of the landmark moments for Native rights and tribal sovereignty over the last 40 years. Past and present tribal leaders and NARF attorneys also provide insight on some of the greatest legal and political challenges still facing Indian Country in the 21st Century.
